Where to => Walking the Talk by measuring results & impact

1. First decade of CAADP was about implementing the PROCESSES (compacts, NAIPS, ITRs,) and getting them right
2. It did help REINSERT agriculture back into the national planning processes and open the POLICY SPACE to new actors
3. Today, more inclusive and evidence-based plans & programmes, comprehensive and better aligned to national priorities and planning and budgeting cycles are needed
4. Malabo puts special emphasis on:
 - ❖ LINKING economic policy and agriculture policy ..this is exactly the issue of agriculture transformation led development, and
 - ❖ a tool called the CAADP RESULTS FRAMEWORK that will help us get the necessary information on HOW THE TRANSFORMATION is taking place and correct as needed



Key Milestones since the Malabo Declaration



I. Repackaging support to countries : more **thematic focus** and content and **less processes**a portfolio of ongoing projects with NPCA and AUC

- 1) Risk management and resilience
- 2) Agriculture, technical and vocation education and training
- 3) Youth development, skills and entrepreneurship
- 4) Nutrition
- 5) Agriculture financing
- 6) Fisheries (FishGov and FishTrade)
- 7) Sustainable land management
- 8) Post-Harvest Management
- 9) etc.



II. Continued support to country strategic planning and implementation

- 1) More than **45** countries now have launched CAADP process
- 2) A total of **42** African countries have signed a CAADP Compact
- 3) a total of **42** National Agricultural Investment Plans (NAIPs)
- 4) A total of **38** NAIPs received support for independent technical review to ensure consistency between expected results and resource allocation
- 5) A total of **31** national Business Meetings held to mobilise resources to implement the NAIPs



III. Continued support to RECs strategic planning and implementation

- 1) RAIP finalised in EAC
 - ❖ Results Framework prepared
- 2) RAIP finalised for ECCAS
 - ❖ ITR completed
 - ❖ Set of 11 key projects profiles prepared
 - ❖ Business meeting planned by end of year
- 3) RAIP in IGAD formulated
 - ❖ ITR planned for October
 - ❖ business meeting planned for October
- 4) COMESA signed Regional Compact

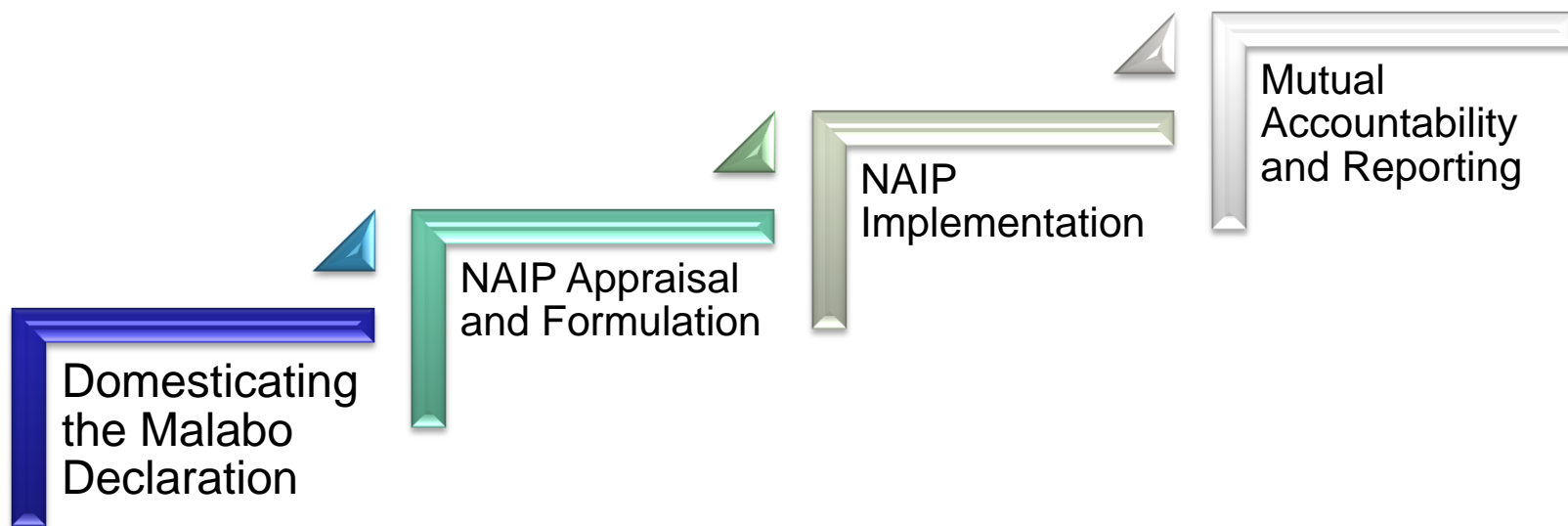


IV. Key documents guiding Malabo operationalisation

- 1) Sustaining the CAADP Momentum to Spur Agriculture Transformation - Achieving Malabo targets through 4 thematic areas. It lays down the VISION and articulates the strategic drivers to sustain the momentum
- 2) CAADP Results Framework with a set of indicators to track performance and report progress – **first time ever**
- 3) Malabo Implementation Strategy & Roadmap
- 4) Programme of Work –with its rollout plan for AUC, NEPAD and RECs work plans (**2015-2016**)
- 5) New CAADP Implementation Guidelines
- 6) Handbook on the Biennial Review
- 7) Design of the Biennial Review Mechanism
- 8) Design of an African Agriculture Transformation Scorecard
