Edson Mpyisi is a Chief Financial Economist and Coordinator of the Enable Youth Program at the African Development Bank Group (AfDB), with over 25 years of experience in economic and agricultural development. His expertise includes policy, research, development finance, and investment strategy across Africa. At AfDB, he led and appraised projects exceeding US\$100 million, focusing on agro-industrial and youth empowerment initiatives. Under his leadership, the Enable Youth Program has mobilized over US\$670 million in 18 countries, fostering youth-led agribusiness and employment. Previously, he served as Head of Agriculture and Food Security at the African Union Commission (2005-2009), leading the Comprehensive Africa Agriculture Development Programme (CAADP). He was also Country Coordinator for the Food Security Research Project in Rwanda, a project by Michigan State University, and was also the Rwanda Country Representative for USAID's Famine Early Warning System Network (FEWSNet). Edson is a strong advocate for agriculture-driven economic transformation and youth empowerment. His work bridges policy, finance, and innovation to support inclusive and resilient food systems across Africa.
